
All About The Alcohol

Key Messages

- 1) Alcohol is a leading contributing factor in crashes on Minnesota roads.
 - Nearly one out of every four deaths on Minnesota roads is drunk driving-related.
 - In the last five years (2010 2014), there were 479 drunk drivingrelated traffic deaths in Minnesota and 88 people were killed in 2014 alone.
 - The average Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) for an impaired driver who died in a drunk-driving-related crash in 2014 was 0.19.

Drunk Driving Arrests

- St. Paul police report about 20 percent of their DWI arrests during the campaign were people who were under the influence of a controlled substance.
- In the city of Baxter, police made six DWI arrests. Four of those arrests were due to being impaired by drugs.

Drugged Driving is Dangerous Driving

If you feel different, you drive different, whether it's from alcohol, cold medicine, a prescription or any other drug. In the last 10 years, Minnesota has seen a significant increase in DWIs involving a controlled substance while alcohol offenses have declined over this same period.



Impaired is Impaired

Law enforcement will be looking for drivers who appear impaired, whether by alcohol or other substances. Driving while impaired by any substance is illegal. Drugged driving incidents are on the rise and it's a growing concern for Minnesota law enforcement.

"We've seen a spike in DWI arrests this year and a pretty significant increase in recent years with the number of drivers who are being arrested for drug-impaired driving," said DPS-OTS Director Mike Hanson. "Drivers need to be aware that cold medicine, prescription medication, recently legalized THC edible products or any other drug can contribute to impairment and a DWI. Driving while impaired can lead to an arrest, or even worse, serious injury or death. Don't take the chance. Always plan for a sober ride."









State Agencies Committed to Keeping People Safe on the Road, Trails and Water as Cannabis Becomes Legal Aug. 1

Departments of Public Safety and Natural Resources Remind Minnesotans that Impaired is Impaired, Regardless of Substance

ST. PAUL — Starting Aug. 1, Minnesotans can legally possess and use cannabis and cannabis products. What isn't changing? It's still illegal to operate a motor vehicle, boat, off-highway vehicle or snowmobile while impaired by cannabis. The Minnesota departments of Public Safety (DPS) and Natural Resources (DNR) want Minnesotans to learn the new law and plan a safe and sober ride if they're cannabis consumers.

"Impaired is impaired on the road, regardless of the substance, and the effects can be tragic for everyone else on the road," said Col. Matt Langer, chief of the Minnesota State Patrol. "Our focus is on impaired driving, regardless of substance, and keeping Minnesotans safe by enforcing the law. Just like with alcohol, anyone opting to consume cannabis needs to make the right choice by planning a safe and sober ride."

















If you feel different, you drive different. While there's not a preliminary breath test for cannabis, law enforcement officers can look for signs of impairment from any substance. Body tremors, failure to control speech. Change in pupil size: All can indicate someone who shouldn't be behind the wheel. Always plan ahead for a safe and sober ride and never drive while impaired on any substance.

Think you can drive high? Think again.

Driving high is a DWI





People may think that they are safer drivers while high; they aren't. Research shows that driving high may increase your risk of a crash since your reaction time is slower, and your understanding of distance and speed is different.



Think of cannabis like alcohol when in your vehicle: Just like it's illegal to have an open container of booze in the car, it will be illegal to have an open container or packaging of any cannabis next month after the products are legalized in Minnesota. The only place to legally store opened cannabis or alcohol is in the trunk of a car or an area not accessible by the driver or passengers.

Traffic Safety and Cannabis in Minnesota

Personal possession and use of certain amounts of cannabis and cannabis products are no longer a crime startistate law allows people age 21 and older to possess or transport legalized amounts.

What kinds of cannabis products does the legislation legalize?

The legalized products include edibles, topicals, concentrates and marijuana flower.

The 2023 legislation expands the legalization of THC-related products. In 2022, it became legal to consume low derived THC edible products.

How much cannabis or products like THC edibles can I legally have in my vehicle

If you're age 21 and older, you can have up to 2 ounces of cannabis flower, 8 grams of concentrated THC and 8 product (including lower-potency THC hemp-derived product).

Can I use cannabis or products like THC edibles while driving?

NEARLY 25% OF DEATHS ON MINNESOTA ROADS ARE DRUNK DRIVING-RELATED.

It is illegal to drive with a Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) of 0.08% or higher. Yet, impaired driving leads to an unacceptable number of linjuries or deaths each year. Driving after drinking any amount of alcohol is dangerous, as numerous factors can lead to your driving being impaired. Mixing alcohol with driving is deadly. That's the sobering truth.





SOBERING TRUTH: DRIVING HIGH IS A DWI.

Personal use of cannabis is legal in Minnesota, but it's illegal to drive while impaired by cannabis. Cannabis can impair driving abilities. Reaction time is slower and understanding of distance and speed is different.

It's also illegal for drivers or passengers to open and consume cannabis products while driving, Just like with alcohol, any opened cannabis products must be kept in an area not accessible by the driver or passengers.

IMPAIRED IS IMPAIRED, REGARDLESS OF THE SUBSTANCE.

Always plan ahead for a safe and sober ride and never drive impaired by alcohol, cannabis or any substance.

If someone you know has been drinking, consuming cannabis or other drugs, don't let them drive.

If you drink, do not drive for any reason. Get a ride.

Hosting a party where alcohol or cannabis products will be offered? **Make sure all guests leave with a safe and sober driver.**

Wear your seat belt. It's your best defense against impaired drivers you may encounter on the road.

What if you see an impaired driver? Call 911.
